President's Report



As I look back on the 2021-22 season, it has been heartening to see that the rainfalls and high commodity prices have continued from last year. There has not been a better time to be a livestock producer and let's hope these prosperous times continue.

Industry Advocacy and Representation

While seasons and prices have been good, there are always challenges that producers and industry face and Livestock SA continued to assist, represent and advocate for producers to address them. Over the past year these included the infrastructure damage caused by floods in the Rangelands and Eyre Peninsula and the increased threats of Lumpy Skin Disease and Foot and Mouth Disease. The resilience of our livestock producers is well known, and it has been on display again in the face of these challenges.

The change of Government at the last election offers the opportunity to positively progress existing and emerging issues including a Biosecurity Act, a Biodiversity Act, the possible implementation of small animal electronic identification and carbon farming.

As biosecurity risks continued to increase, our priority refocused on Emergency Animal Disease and achieving systems and structures that offer a level of confidence in our ability to prepare and respond if the unthinkable should occur.

Livestock SA Changes

In 2021, Livestock SA undertook an organisational review, and the Board are currently working through the recommendations. The review highlighted that we had outgrown the arrangements of shared services and a joint Chief Executive Officer with the SA Dairyfarmers Association (SADA).

In November 2021, shared CEO Andrew Curtis resigned from Livestock SA to start a fulltime role with SADA. On behalf of Livestock SA, I thank Andrew for his 7 years of leadership during which he guided the organisation through a period of growth and supported the development of several projects.

Livestock SA's search for a new CEO resulted in the appointment of Travis Tobin, who brings a wealth of experience in advocacy, policy and management of farming organisations including Queensland Farmers' Federation and Cattle Council of Australia. We were very fortunate to attract someone of Travis' calibre to lead and implement positive change.

A sustainable Livestock SA

Livestock SA has built a large project base relative to the size of the organisation, which has underpinned our structure and allowed us to build a level of scale to facilitate outreach and support of members. While we continue to bid for projects that deliver benefits to members, they are sporadic in nature, and we can no longer rely upon this as a source of funding to support our core policy and advocacy functions.

Livestock SA began in 2013 with core funding from the Sheep and Cattle Industry Funds to support 1,000 members. In 2022, Livestock SA has 3,500 members and is recognised as the voice of the SA sheep, cattle and goat industry in South Australia. It is essential we develop a sustainable base to meet the needs of our membership and drive more initiatives that are important to the membership and the broader industry.

A cohesive, collaborative Livestock SA

In the past years, Livestock SA has taken on more functions and greater responsibilities, including administration of the industry funds and the industry blueprints. Each of these committees have memberships of dedicated producers, who give time for industry benefit. For historical reasons, our industry groups have worked in isolation, without Livestock SA oversight when the Livestock SA Board is

now ultimately accountable for positions taken or decisions made. The Board has discussed this risk at length and is determined to create a more cohesive, collaborative and sustainably funded organisation where all the parts work together to deliver a consistent focus and greater outcomes for our industry.

Livestock SA works with Primary Producers SA, and the other commodity group members, to have a more extensive influence on cross commodity issues and nationally through the National Farmers' Federation. We also remain members of four peak industry councils — Cattle Council of Australia, Sheep Producers Australia, Wool Producers Australia and the Goat Industry Council of Australia — to influence the national policies and priorities for the cattle, sheep, wool and goat industries.

Thank you and acknowledgements

I thank board members for supporting and working through the changes and challenges of the year. We continue to set the agenda for some exciting developments over the next 12 months for our organisation and industry. I would like to acknowledge and farewell Bill Nosworthy, Marina Gregor and Robert Brokenshire, I thank them for their counsel and service to Livestock SA.

I acknowledge our CEO Travis and the ongoing effort he is making towards operational improvements. He leads the team of Aleesha, Pene, Tom and Libby with shared services admin support from Alison and Kelly. We appreciate the team, that continues to produce high quality work that keeps Livestock SA relevant on members issues. I would also like to acknowledge the contributions of the staff who have left the organisation and I thank them for their efforts.

Finally, thank you to all our Livestock SA Members, it is important that we hear from you so we can respond actively to concerns. Please feel free to contact Board members or our team.

I am sure we will have a productive and successful year ahead, as an industry and a livestock body that serves with distinction.

CEO's Report



At the close of the 2021-22 financial year, I had been four months in the role at Livestock SA. The organisation is at an important juncture in its short history as it continues to evolve so it can deliver greater services to and outcomes for the 3,500 South Australian beef cattle, sheep and goat producers it represents.

With red meat and wool production in South Australia accounting for over 25 per cent of the agricultural sector's total \$15.4 billion value, and with grazing being the most geographically diverse agricultural activity that provides land stewardship for more than half the total area of the state, Livestock SA has an important role in driving the right policy settings and programs to deliver profitable, sustainable livestock businesses.

This is a critical time for livestock production businesses. As producers rebuild their herds and flocks following drought and the industry faces sustainability, traceability, animal welfare, and trade pressures, the ever-present threat of an exotic disease incursion has now also come to the fore.

Biosecurity awareness and preparedness activities were heightened in March 2022 when lumpy skin disease (LSD) was officially reported in Indonesia, and they escalated further when foot and mouth disease (FMD) was also reported in Indonesia in May 2022. The Australian Government's expert biosecurity risk panel estimates the chance that Australia will experience an outbreak in the next five years is now 28 per cent for LSD and nearly 12 per cent for FMD. Livestock SA responded quickly to the increased biosecurity risks the state's livestock industries currently face with increased member communications, media engagement, community awareness activities and input to various national and state taskforces and working groups.

The political landscape also changed considerably in the second half of the financial year with Labor winning back government at state and federal levels in March and May 2022 respectively. Livestock SA has positively engaged with the Malinauskas Government during its first few months in office and looks forward to a constructive working relationship with key portfolio ministers, their offices and departments over the next few years.

Operationally, Livestock SA is now a multi-dimensional organisation that needs to structure and sustainably resource itself to effectively deliver its roles and responsibilities on behalf of the beef, sheep meat, goat meat, and wool industries, and be accountable for its performance. The future for South Australia's livestock producers is bright and Livestock SA has a vital role in empowering them to determine that future.

Thank you to all our members for their ongoing support; industry leaders that continue to offer their valuable time, experience and expertise to inform the work of organisation; the Livestock SA Board, in particular President Joe Keynes for his selfless leadership; and the small, dedicated team at Livestock SA.

About Livestock SA



Livestock SA is a not-for-profit member organisation representing beef cattle, sheep and goat producers in South Australia.
Livestock SA works to inform government, businesses and the wider community on livestock producers' contribution to the food and fibre industries and to the wider South Australian economy.

Membership is free to all South Australian livestock producers. Associate membership is available to other members of the industry and supply chain for a fee.

Livestock SA is a commodity group member of Primary Producers SA (PPSA), which works with other commodity groups on issues affecting all farmers both locally and nationally.

Livestock SA is the South Australian member of the national peak industry councils: Sheep Producers Australia, WoolProducers Australia, Cattle Council of Australia and Goat Industry Council of Australia. Through PPSA and the peak councils, Livestock SA is also a member of the National Farmers Federation.

Livestock SA's primary focus is policy and advocacy which is made possible by industry assistance through producer levies on sheep and cattle. The levy money is collected through the SA Sheep and Cattle Industry Funds.

Representation and Advocacy

Livestock SA's core function of policy and advocacy is funded through the Sheep and Cattle Industry Fund program. This program contributes to a profitable and sustainable industry and is made possible by sheep and cattle producer levies.

Livestock Biosecurity

Livestock SA continued to advocate for best practice biosecurity, and through targeted activities has influenced and improved the biosecurity practices of producers and the broader supply chain. Over this period the Biosecurity Animal Health and Welfare Advisory Committee (BAHWAC) advised the Livestock SA Board on a number of topics including livestock pain management, animal welfare and sheep traceability.

In April 2022, BAHWAC and the biosecurity extension team initiated the Inaugural Livestock Biosecurity Summit that brought together key stakeholders from across the supply chain to design a strategy and framework for biosecurity priorities, activities and resourcing for the future of the industry. This 'Livestock Biosecurity Blueprint' will be released in the new financial year.

From March 2022 until the close of the financial year (and beyond), Livestock SA's biosecurity focus and resourcing shifted to the detection of Lumpy Skin Disease and Foot and Mouth disease in Indonesia. In response to these increased threats, Livestock SA has been involved in national industry updates and taskforce activities to ensure SA's sheep, cattle and goat producers' interests are represented. Livestock SA also increased membership communications through a specific Emergency Animal Disease Biosecurity Bulletin from the Livestock Biosecurity Extension project as well as specific social media updates.

The detections of LSD and FMD on our doorstep is a stark reminder that governments at all levels need to invest in long-term, sustainable funding pipelines for biosecurity and Livestock SA continues to advocate for this to ensure we have well-funded biosecurity frameworks and activities in our state.

SA Dog Fence

Livestock SA continued to be heavily involved in the rebuild of the South Australian section of the Dog Fence. This has included lobbying the previous Liberal Government and securing financial support for PIRSA's wild dog eradication program inside the fence. At the SA Dog Fence Committee meeting in April 2022 it was reported that the rebuilt fence stood up well to the January 2022 floods (sections of the old fence washed away), but unforeseen cost increases across all areas means that a funding shortfall to complete the fence is likely.

Sheep traceability

Livestock SA has lobbied successive Ministers and Shadow Ministers seeking their commitment and financial support to review sheep traceability, establish a SA Sheep Traceability Steering Committee and state-wide investigations to develop a business case and implementation plan. Funding was secured for this from the Department of Primary Industries and Regions in June 2022.

Definition of meat and other animal products

Livestock SA submitted a strong position seeking legislative change to the Senate Inquiry investigating the definitions of meat and other animal products, supporting our position with a presentation to the Committee on Rural and Regional Affairs and Transport. Our efforts, and those of other livestock industry representative bodies, were rewarded with the Committee making nine recommendations, including that a regulatory framework for labelling plant-based protein products be established. It also recommended a national standard be developed to restrict the use of 'meat category brands' to animal protein products.



Pastoral Lands Bill

Livestock SA held numerous meetings with the former Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development, PIRSA, and environmental and conservation stakeholder groups to progress positive reform to the Pastoral Lands Bill. Disappointingly, the former government did not progress the Bill through Parliament. Post-election, the new Labor Government has transitioned the Pastoral Unit from PIRSA back into the Department of Environment and Water from 1 July 2022. It is understood that Deputy Premier Susan Close intends to update the Pastoral Act, although details are yet to be made clear. Livestock SA will continue to work with the government to improve this legislation.

Flood Recovery Activities

Livestock SA collaborated with Grain Producers South Australia and PIRSA to support recovery efforts from the January 2022 floods in Northern South Australia and the Eyre Peninsula. Livestock SA undertook a survey to collate members flood impact data for PIRSA, as well as were involved in an aerial surveying activity to assess the extent of the damage. The combined efforts resulted in a better and more informed recovery response from PIRSA, the Department of Infrastructure and Transport, and local governments. Livestock SA continues to sit on the Flood Recovery Stakeholder Reference Group.

Enhanced Abattoir Surveillance (EAS)

Livestock SA successfully facilitated the transition of the SIF-funded, PIRSA-managed EAS program at Thomas Food International's (TFI) Lobethal plant to a model managed internally by TFI with the short-term support of Animal Health Australia's National Sheep Health Monitoring project. Surveillance data (such as frequency of arthritis, grass seed damage and fractures) for lambs and sheep processed through Lobethal will shortly be available to producers in (close to) real-time via their Livestock Data Link (LDL) portal when they go on-line to confirm the accurate transfer of stock.

State-based Cross Sectoral Policy

Livestock SA was an integral player in the successful bid to the former State Government to increase Primary Producers South Australia (PPSA) resourcing over the last 12 months. This improved structure provides a better mechanism to deliver cross sectoral policy positions that impact multiple primary production sectors. Three core committees have been formed to cover issues: Transport and Supply Chain; Natural Resource Management; and Work Health and Safety. Livestock SA delegates represent all PPSA commodities on the NFF committees: Telecommunications and Social Policy; Trade; and Workforce.

State Budget 2022-23

Livestock SA attended the budget lock-up on 2 June 2022 where the new Labor Government handed down its first budget. While all election commitments were funded, there were few highlights for our industries. Of particular concern was further funding cuts to PIRSA, particularly with government claims that there were no cuts to frontline services. PIRSA's biosecurity role is absolutely a frontline service, and Livestock SA will continue to advocate strongly for a properly resourced state biosecurity framework and a well-funded government department to assist the livestock industry's continued growth and profitability.

Membership and Communications

Livestock SA continues to develop and grow its membership, from 3,456 on 30 June 2021, to 3,480 on 30 June 2022. In 2021 Livestock SA implemented a new Client Relationship Management (CRM) program that has systemised the old member database allowing the organisation to better track membership and sort data. Further development will also enable the organisation to better engage with and represent members to deliver more robust and supportable policy positions and associated advocacy efforts.

During 2021-22, Livestock SA distributed 11 newsletters to members, continued to regularly appear on TV and radio, and provided written comment to various publications to represent the interests of livestock producers and the broader industry.

Member Services

Northern Region: On 2 December 2022, Livestock SA attended the SA Arid Lands Pastoral Field Days. At this event the organisation hosted a Northern Region meeting in conjunction with the SA Arid Lands Landscapes Board pastoral field days. This event attracted over 60 people.

Southern Region: A Southern Region meeting was scheduled to be held on 11 February 2022 in Robe but had to be cancelled due to COVID 19. Planning is underway for future regional meetings.

Industrial Relations: Livestock SA continued to provide industrial relations services to members through Mediation and Employment Relations Services (MERS). Under this partnership, members receive the first 30 minutes free, followed by a discounted rate for advice on employment contracts and the Pastoral Award, WorkCoverSA, termination of employment such as unfair dismissal and unlawful termination, workplace discrimination or bullying and harassment.

Projects

Sheep and Cattle Industry Blueprints

Since first being developed 2015 (Sheep) and 2018 (Beef), the Industry Blueprints have provided a shared, strategic plan the industry and served as a focal point for investment priorities and programs for industry stakeholders along the value chain including Government, research and extension agencies. The Blueprints also serve as a roadmap to guide Livestock SA's policy development and advocacy priorities.

Both Industry Blueprints have lofty goals and stakeholders across our sectors. Focus in the first half of the year revolved around maintaining the momentum of the 2030 Sheep Industry Blueprint launched earlier in 2022, and establishing beneficial partnerships between the new Blueprint Manager and key sector decision-makers responsible for driving change. As the year progressed the Blueprint turned its attention to beef and the common factors affecting both sectors: carbon and workforce.

A Carbon Focus Group is being established to bring together strategic expertise from across government and industry, as producers are increasingly being tempted by the carbon credit market. Proven production techniques which actively reduce the carbon footprint of beef and sheep production, whilst also securing parallel goals around on-farm production, sustainability and profit will be identified through the group's work.

Whilst workforce challenges are not new to our sector or others in regional SA, it has been exacerbated by COVID and people's resulting change in the way they think about employment. Some key research and initiatives to tackle this issue have started and we will be seeking appropriate experts to join a Workforce Focus Group before the end of 2022

The 2021-22 mid-term review of the SA Beef Industry Blueprint was delayed due to Covid-related staffing issues and will now commence in August 2022.

Livestock Biosecurity Extension Project

Livestock SA will complete the Livestock Biosecurity
Extension project funded by the Department of Primary
Industries and Regions' Red Meat and Wool Growth Program
in October 2022. This concludes a 2.5-year partnership
focused on building better biosecurity culture in South
Australia for the livestock industries.

This project delivered communications through the Biosecurity Bulletin newsletter, social media 'Biosecurity Tip of the Week,' and bi-monthly Stock Journal article.

Livestock SA's Biosecurity Extension work included the following key activities during this period:

- 7 x Better Health for Better Wealth Workshops across the state. Over 120 participants attended these workshops and feedback was very positive.
- Filming and production of 6 Enhanced Abattoir Surveillance Videos that were released in February 2022
- 1x Buying and Selling Livestock Livestock Agent Breakfasts was held at Murray Bridge (Partnership with PIRSA Biosecurity SA)
- Delivery of the Sheep Carcass Conditions Virtual Reality Tool (Animal Health Australia's tool funded in collaboration with PIRSA)
- Delivery of 8 Podcasts focused on Biosecurity and Animal Health.
- 1x online delivery of the Simple Steps to Safeguard On farm Biosecurity
- 1 x coordination and delivery of the Livestock Biosecurity Summit
- 6 x Enhanced Abattoir Surveillance Videos to improve producer understanding of specific conditions that are economically important to their business
- · 2 x NLIS workshop on Kangaroo Island

Recently the program was successful in securing additional funding for this project to continue into 2023 through the Sheep and Cattle Industry Funds. This will ensure a continuity of work to build on the foundations set through the efforts of Livestock SA.



NLIS Cattle Movement Dashboard

A prototype 'Dashboard' capable of interpreting and displaying cattle movement captured by NLIS data to assist industry decision making in areas such as biosecurity, policy and advocacy has been developed. It will also play a role in monitoring progress against Blueprint targets. A dashboard will also be developed for sheep now that proof-of-concept has been completed in cattle.

Sheep Traceability Project

As a result of our advocacy, Livestock SA will undertake the Sheep Traceability Project which is being funded by PIRSA and the Sheep Industry Fund. The project will deliver a business case outlining the requirements for implementing an electronic identification system (eID) for sheep and goats in SA to be considered by a supply chain steering committee. Implementation and communications plans will also be developed to ensure the most efficient and effective process for implementing a mandatory sheep electronic identification system in the state.

Revitalising Private Conservation in SA Program

The \$3 million Revitalising Private Conservation in South Australia (RPCSA) pilot program has provided existing and aspiring Native Vegetation Heritage Agreement owners with financial and technical support since late 2020. The pilot stage of the program has seen \$2 million of grant funding delivered to 125 projects across South Australia with a \$4.7 million in-kind contribution from landholders. The

RPCSA team interviewed more than 50 property owners, surveyed owners and stakeholders, visited more than 40 properties, and held events and information sessions across the state. The need for support of private land conservation landholders was evident through the 200% oversubscription across the three grant rounds.

Livestock SA hosted a fulltime Outreach Officer within the unique partnership of 5 non-government organisations (four conservation plus Livestock SA) and was funded by the Department of Environment and Water.

AgRi-Silience Program

The AgRi-Silience Program was delivered by Livestock SA as part of the Farm Business Resilience Program, funded by the Australian Government's Future Drought Fund and PIRSA. Livestock SA worked with Grain Producers SA until 30 June 2022 to deliver the program which targeted broadacre producers. From July 2022 onwards, the AgRi-Silience Program is a Livestock SA-only initiative.

The premise of the Farm Business Resilience Program is to provide producers with the opportunity to take time to work on their business, not just in it. The major focus areas of the Program are farm risk management and decision making, business management and planning, natural resource management and personal and social resilience. Livestock SA contracted the Coo-ee Collective and Pinion Advisory to facilitate the workshops and coaching with participants. Delays in contract signing, competition with similar programs and other events in key engagement periods, plus COVID impacts significantly impacted the Program's delivery.



Livestock Biosecurity Summit and Blueprint

Livestock SA held the inaugural Livestock Biosecurity Summit to discuss and uncover biosecurity priorities for the state. The event attracted over 50 producers, agents, livestock transporters, peak industry groups and PIRSA employees. Information gathered through the summit will inform the Livestock Biosecurity Blueprint that will be the guiding document for biosecurity in South Australia, and underpin the targets in the Sheep and Beef Blueprints. This Livestock Biosecurity Blueprint will be released at the Livestock SA Annual General Meeting in August.

Kangaroo Island Bushfire Recovery and Innovation Projects

Livestock SA has worked in collaboration with PIRSA and AgKI to support recovery of the from the 2020 bushfires. Funding for the recovery and innovation projects come from underspends within the KI hay ferrying and freight program which Livestock SA coordinated in early 2020. Eleven projects valued at \$846,443 are being funded and include drone spraying in rough terrain, establishment of additional soil moisture probes, cat trapping programs and blue gum regrowth removal.

Industry Funds

The 2022 financial year was the second year Livestock SA administered the Sheep and Cattle Industry Funds (SIF and CIF), which were previously administered by PIRSA.

All sheep owners in South Australia contribute \$0.67 per head to the SIF when 5 or more sheep are sold for \$5 per head or more. Cattle owners who purchase Permanent Identification Devices (tags) pay \$1.50 per tag, which is collected by authorised tag manufacturers and recyclers and forwarded to the CIF on behalf of the cattle owner.

Operating on an annual funding cycle, calls for applications occur in February each year. Applications received are assessed by independent SIF and CIF Boards, who provide recommendations to the Livestock SA Board which is then responsible for writing to the Minister for Primary Industries and Regions to request the release of funds for those projects approved for the following financial year.



Sheep Industry Fund



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Notes to the Financial Statements

Livestock SA Incorporated For the year ended 30 June 2022

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial report is a special purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Accounting Standards and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 1985.

The financial report covers Livestock SA Incorporated as an individual entity. Livestock SA Incorporated is an association incorporated in South Australia under the Associations Incorporation Act 1985.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where stated, current valuations of non-current assets. Cost is based on the fair values of the consideration given in exchange for assets.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the economic entity in the preparation of the financial report. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

Income Tax

The Association does not pay income tax and no provision for income tax is made.

Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

a) Property

Freehold land and buildings are measured on the fair value basis, being the amount for which an asset could be exchanged between knowledgeable willing parties in an arm's length transaction. It is a policy of Livestock SA Incorporated to have an independent valuation every three years, with annual appraisals being made by the directors.

The revaluation of freehold land and buildings has not taken account of the potential capital gains tax on assets acquired after the introduction of capital gains tax.

b) Plant and equipment

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from those assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows that will be received from the asset's employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have not been discounted to present values in determining the recoverable amounts.

c) Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets including buildings and capitalised leased assets, but excluding freehold land, is depreciated on a straight-line basis over their useful lives to Livestock SA Incorporated commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. Properties held for investment purposes are not subject to a depreciation charge.

Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

Employee Provisions

These notes should be read in conjunction with the attached compilation report.

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Provision is made for the liability for employee entitlements arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. Employee entitlements expected to be settled within one year together with entitlements arising from wages and salaries, long service leave and annual leave which will be settled after one year, have been measured at their nominal amount. Other employee entitlements payable later than one year have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash out flows to be made for those entitlements.

Comparative Figures

Where required by Accounting Standards comparative figures have been adjusted to conform with changes in presentation for the current financial year.

Revenue

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised upon the delivery of goods to customers.

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking in to account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

Revenue from investment income is accrued when receivable.

Revenue from the rendering of a service is recognised upon the delivery of the service to the customers.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).
